Virginia opossum	Didelphis virginiana	Not native in California (CA); first introduced in CA near San Jose in 1900; a common and widespread omnivore.	
Brazilian or Mexican free-tailed bat	Tadarida brasiliensis	Aerial insect feeder.	
Coyote	Canis latrans	Regular on the north side of Davis; first observed at West Pond (WP) in August 2014; also known as the "Song Dog".	
Raccoon	Procyon lotor	Omnivore; widespread; breeds at WP.	
River otter	Lontra canadensis* Lutra canadensis	Semi-aquatic; eats crayfish, fish, and frogs; first detected in the 1990s at WP.	
Striped skunk	Mephitis mephitis	An omnivore, but mainly insectivorous.	
American mink	Mustela vison	Crepuscular; occurs along streams, marshes; semi-aquatic; first detected in March 2014.	
California ground squirrel	Spermophilus beecheyi	Makes burrows; last seen in 1991 at WP.	
Western gray squirrel	Sciurus griseus	First detected in 2013 at WP; typically found in woodlands and forests.	
Fox squirrel	Sciurus niger	Not native; native from Great Plains eastward; locally common.	
Botta's pocket gopher	Thomomys bottae	Fossorial. In 2013, active burrows were detected in the south-end of WP; in 2014 burrows were found on a southern island.	
California vole	Microtus californicus	Occurs in wetlands, grasslands.	
Common muskrat	Ondatra zibethicus	Not native west of the Sierra Nevada; eastern muskrats were introduced into northern CA valleys in the 1920s; semi-aquatic; not seen since 2001 at WP.	
House mouse	Mus musculus	Not native to North America (NA); originally from Asia; arrived in NA during the earliest English settlements in the U.S.	
Norway or brown rat	Rattus norvegicus	Not native to NA; originally from Asia; arrived on the East Coast 1755-76 and often displaced the roof rat which arrived earlier; semi-aquatic; the "sewer rat".	
Roof or black rat	Rattus rattus	Not native to NA; originally from Asia; introduced to NA around 1609; often displaced by the more aggressive Norway rat.	

Black-tailed jackrabbit	Lepus californicus	It's a hare; often active during the daytime.	
Desert or Audubon's cottontail	Sylvilagus audubonii	It's a rabbit; uses bunchgrass, shrubs for cover.

California (Western) toad	Anaxyrus boreas halophilus* Bufo boreas halophilus	Breeds in WP; occurs in upland habitats most of the year; the calls are a series of mellow high-pitched "chirps".	
Sierran treefrog* Pacific chorus frog Pacific treefrog American bullfrog	Pseudacris sierra* Pseudacris regilla Hyla regilla Lithobates catesbeianus* Rana catesbeiana	Recent taxonomic changes; common; semi- aquatic; breeds in WP; frequently heard calling "kreck-ek and ribbit". Native east of the Rocky Mts; introduced to CA in 1905; widespread; the call is a deep-	
California tiger salamander	Ambystoma californiense	pitched "vr-vroom"; breeds in WP. In 1993 an adult was found in an apartment complex near WP; its origins are unclear, although it's unlikely that it was a wild animal; a threatened species.

Northwestern fence lizard	Sceloporus o. occidentalis	Breeds in WP; occurs in upland habitats.	
Western yellow-bellied racer	Coluber constrictor mormon	Occurs mostly in upland habitats.	
Pacific gopher snake	Pituophis c. catenifer* Pituophis melanoleucus c.	Common; occurs mostly in upland habitats; feeds on rodents, reptiles, and eggs.	
Valley (Common) gartersnake	Thamnophis sirtalis fitchi	Common along streams, sloughs, marshes.	
Western pond turtle	Actinemys marmorata* Emys marmorata Clemmys marmorata	Native; semi-aquatic; nests in upland habitats; declined in many areas of CA; a CA species of special concern.	
Red-eared slider (turtle)	Trachemys scripta elegans* Pseudomys scripta elegans	Native in the eastern U.S.; released at many CA locations; considered invasive and spreading; semi-aquatic; breeds at WP.

Western mosquitofish	Gambusia affinis	Native to the mid-west U.S.; introduced to CA in 1922; found in Putah Creek (Yolo Co.) by 1923; planted for mosquito control.	
Common carp	Cyprinus carpio	Native to Asia or the Caspian Sea region; possibly the first fish cultured by humans; first introduced in CA (Sonoma Co.) in 1872; introduced for sport and food.
