

**Record of Senator Geo. F. Jones,
Candidate for Prosecuting Attorney,
On Temperance Question.**

Mr. Jones, in his letter addressed to the Women of the Sixth Judicial District, states: "I voted for prohibition both in the House and in the Senate."

You asked me if the Hon. George F. Jones was a friend to prohibition while he was a member of the last State Senate.

In answer I will say that Mr. Jones was not a friend to prohibition. In fact, he was one of the strongest opponents to the 'bone-dry' bill in the Legislature. He tried every way possible to defeat it and was one of the only five senators who voted against the bill on its final passage in the Senate.
