

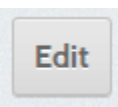
Sharing SLO WikiJam Reference Sheet

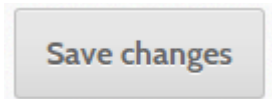
This is part of the SLO “LocalWiki,” a website about San Luis Obispo that anyone can edit. We will add information to this site about the local sharing economy.



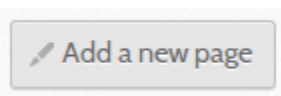
How do I edit a page?



From any page on the wiki, click the **Edit** button next to the title of the page. This brings up an edit window that is much like what you would see in a word processor. When you are finished with your editing, click the **Save changes** button.

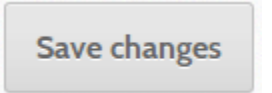
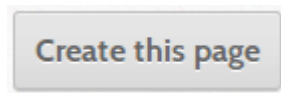


How do I create a new page?



From any page on the wiki, click the **Add a new page** button in the upper-right corner. That button will be replaced by an input field marked **Name of page**. Type in a name for your new page here and hit enter (or return) on your keyboard. You will then see the message “**Page ‘Your New Page’ does not exist (yet!)**”. Click the **Create this page** button to begin editing the new page. When you are finished with your editing, click the **Save changes** button.

What is the “sharing economy”?

That’s a good question, but there’s no authoritative answer. I think we’ll discover what the local sharing economy is, and who is participating in it and how, by connecting the dots in exercises like this.

Who owns the content on the SLO LocalWiki?

All content in the SLO LocalWiki is **public domain**. That means anyone can use it for any purpose and nobody can restrict how anyone can use it by claiming copyright. If you contribute any content to the SLO LocalWiki you are agreeing to release that content into the public domain and to relinquish any intellectual property rights you have over it.

It is important that anything you add to the site either is already in the public domain or is something that you own or create and that you agree to release into the public domain. So, for example, don’t download a picture from somewhere else on the web and then upload it to SLO LocalWiki without verifying first that the picture is in the public domain.

What if two people try to edit the same page at the same time?

LocalWiki is smart enough that if two people try to edit the same page at the same time it will try to intelligently merge the changes both people have made. If it gets confused and isn’t sure how to do the merge, it may ask you to fix it yourself.
